MINI REUNION HOSTED BY DON SPEAKMAN '64



We continue to succeed at academics. Our last semester chapter GPA was 2.92, fifth place among fraternities on the Hill. In addition, 11 brothers earned a place on the dean's list. This accomplishment has helped us gain additional recognition with the University and National Headquarters.

As always, the RER is a tough process and a pressing issue for all fraternities at Lehigh. However, we continue to meet the challenge, and last semester we received a score of 97 of 100 points. The RER requirements were again revised, so some changes will need to be made by the chapter to continue our prior success with the program.

We continue to maintain our presence in the Lehigh and Bethlehem communities. We are currently working with the area school children through afternoon visits every Wednesday at the local Boys and Girls Clubs. We have new ideas on how to improve the collection process for 2000.

We are constantly making improvements to the house. The primary project from last year, the Chapter Room, was completed with the delivery of new drapes in October. The receivers have been placed in the dining room and cold dorm, although they can be moved in the future. We have also improved the cold dorm with some newer couches and tables for our during Sunday and Monday night rush events.
